

The minutes were approved and Sally Zook gave the Treasurer's report.

The Membership Committee reported a new member, Janet Horne, and 47 of our 76 members were present.

Peggy Johnson announced that Christa Moser will be coming in October and will teach the "Star Quilt" pattern. It will require the 60 degree Creative Grids ruler and a pattern.

Jenny Grandfield reported on Eagle Ranch. She thanked Jenny Thomas and Jenny's sister, Patsy, for organizing and selling Jean Leslie's fabric to raise funds for Eagle Ranch quilts.

Laura Nagy is continuing with our charitable projects. She still has kits available for comfort pillows.

Chris Anderson announced that at the September meeting members can begin signing up for next year's retreat which will be February 11-14, 2020. The fee is \$175 and may be paid in installments if you wish. Chris also has bags we can fill with small fabric scraps for the Humane Society.

Ginny Hendrix held the first meeting of the "Tula Pink fabric exchange group after the end of our regular meeting. They are fusing her book "Modern Quilt Blocks". Each member of the group will take a turn to supply every other member with a fat eighth of batik fabric of her choice and her block selection from the book.

The meeting concluded with our raffle and a great "Show and Tell".
