Medallion Mystery Quilt Along

2nd Row

We are doing a simple border to break up each row. ****NOTE** – If you want to be even more scrappy or adventurous, you can do a strip of 2.5" squares, add cornerstones to your strips, or you can do half square triangles – the possibilities are endless!!! The in between border size may change each month so don't think each month will be 2.5".

Cutting – 2 strips of your choice of fabric 2.5" x 12.5"

2 strips of your choice of fabric 2.5" x 16.5"

Sew your strips 12.5" strips to the sides of the center medallion and your 16.5" strips to the top and bottom of the center medallion. Your center should now measure 16.5" square.

3rd Row – Easy Option – Four Patches

Make 20 Four Patch blocks. You can make them as scrappy or controlled as you want.

Cutting – Assorted squares 2.5" x 2.5" (80 total squares) and put together in a four patch. Each Four Patch will finish at 4.5" square.

Check out the link below for Elaine Huff's methods for making a four patch. I think she has 4 different methods. A great way to learn how to sew and iron this easy block.

Join 4 sets of Four Patches together to form a pieced strip. Repeat for a total of two pieced strips measuring 4.5" x 16.5" and sew each set to each side of the medallion

Join 6 sets of Four Patches together to form a pieced strip. Repeat for a total of two pieced strips measuring 4.5" x 24.5" and sew each set to the top and bottom of the medallion.



3rd Row – Harder Option – Liberty Legacy Block

I was looking for a different block. Something not everyone has made, hopefully. I came across this block from the Liberty Legacy quilt by Kim Diehl. I think will make a pretty row. I have listed colors for the fabric because it matches the directions. You do not have to use the colors I listed. However, please note that two different creams are used. If you want to use two different ones it could add a little optical illusion to the next row.

Cutting – 3 strips of cream 2.5” WOF sub cut the strips into 10 rectangles, 2.5” x 8.5”

3 strips of cream 2.5” WOF, sub cut the strips into 20 rectangles, 2.5” x 4.5”

2 strips of dark blue 2.5” WOF, sub cut the strips into 20 squares, 2.5” x 2.5”

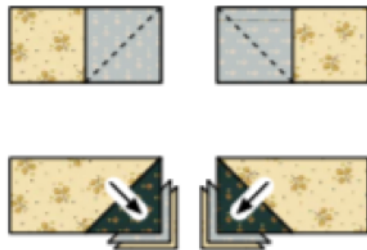
3 strips of red 4.5” WOF, sub cut the strips into 20 squares, 4.5” x 4.5”

MAKE 10 of the blocks using the instructions below. NOT FOUR like the directions say – MAKE 10!!

Each block should finish at 4.5” x 8.5”.

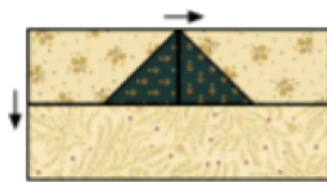


Layer a prepared dark blue $2\frac{1}{2}$ " square onto one end of a cream sprigs and stars $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle, as shown. Join the pair along the drawn line. Press the resulting inner triangle open, aligning the corner with the corner of the cream rectangle. Trim away the layers beneath the top triangle, leaving a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance. In the same manner, sew a mirror-image triangle unit. Repeat for a total of two pieced triangle units and two pieced mirror-image triangle units from each of the two dark blue prints, with each triangle unit measuring $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ ", including the seam allowances.



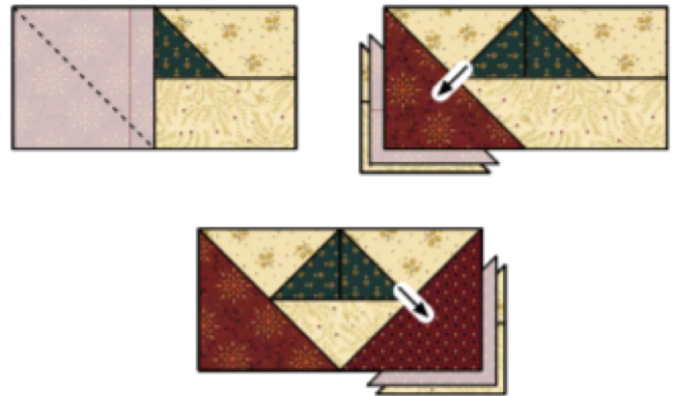
Make 2 units and 2 mirror-image units from the 2 dark blue prints, $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $4\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Join a triangle unit and a mirror-image triangle unit from one matching blue print. Press the seam allowances to one side, in the direction that produces the best point. Join this unit to a cream stars and toile $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x $8\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle as shown. Press. Repeat for a total of four pieced side triangle units measuring $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x $8\frac{1}{2}$ ", including the seam allowances.



Make 4 side triangle units, $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x $8\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Draw a diagonal sewing line on the wrong side of each red $4\frac{1}{2}$ " square as previously instructed. Referring to the illustration, layer, stitch, press, and trim a prepared red square onto a side triangle unit as instructed in step 5. In the same manner, add a red mirror-image star point to the remaining end of the unit. Repeat for a total of four pieced red star point units measuring $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x $8\frac{1}{2}$ ", including the seam allowances.

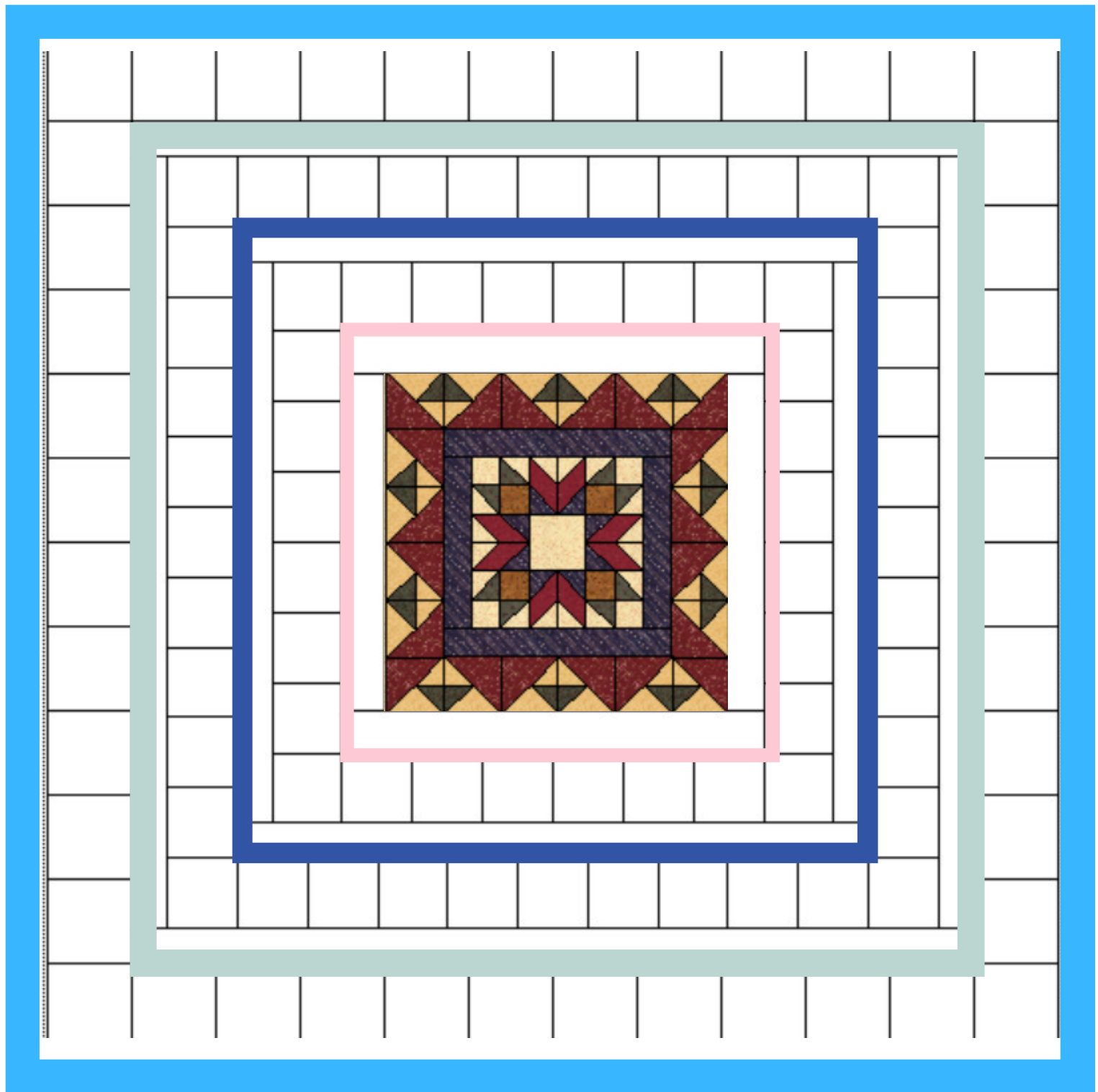


Make 4 red star point units, $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x $8\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Join 2 sets of Liberty Legacy blocks together to form a pieced strip. Repeat for a total of two pieced strips measuring 4.5 " x 16.5 " and sew each set to each side of the medallion.

Join 3 sets of Liberty Legacy blocks together to form a pieced strip. Repeat for a total of two pieced strips measuring 4.5 " x 24.5 " and sew each set to the top and bottom of the medallion.

Your quilt top should now measure 24.5 " square.
